We decided to try something new and see if it might work out for all future meetings. The meeting was well attended but as always, we encourage as many of you as possible to attend. The Board has several items that we will be working on through the winter months. Some old and some new. They include resolving the drainage issue on Riesling Court, replacing streetlights and parking island lights that have gone out, acquiring a storage shed for the RV parking lot, and initiating the placement of a memorial bench (because of a donation made by a homeowner) that would be placed halfway along East Arbor Drive for everyone's use.

Items brought up by homeowners present at the meeting included better access to the sidewalk that rings the entire Vineyard property, the possibility of some type of insurance that would cover homeowners in the event of water service line breaks, and the possibility of the lawn service not being done on Federal Holidays in the spring/summer. More on these items as we go forward.

Finally, the Vineyard is a unique place to live in that we have 202 homes located within a relatively small but beautiful area. Just a gentle reminder that we all try to respect each other with regards to the rules and regulations of the HOA. Thank you.

Winter Driving Safety

Although this winter has been fairly mild, with days near 60 making it feel like spring, it is always a good idea to make sure you are prepared for winter driving in Colorado.

Starting with your vehicle the following list is a good place to start to ensure safe winter travel:

- your windshield wiper fluid is full.
- the wiper blades work well.
- your tire tread is at least 3/16" deep. Bonus if the are snow tires.

Some handy items that you can carry with you incase of an accident or if you slide off the road include:

- sturdy ice scraper
- flashlight with extra batteries
- first aid kit
- jumper cables
- tow strap/tire chains
- blanket
- drinking water
- non-clumping cat litter or sand
- non-perishable snacks

It is important to be very alert when driving in snow and ice conditions. It is best to take a defensive stance and slow down. Allow extra time to get to your destination. Remember to leave extra space between you and the vehicle in front of you. Slick conditions may require extra stopping distance to come to a complete, safe stop.

Planning your Winter Travel

If you have to travel when the road conditions are poor it is also a good idea to check trusted websites like <u>COTrip.org</u> for up-to-date road conditions, closures and warnings.

New Community Bench Coming Soon

A community member recently donated some money to install a bench to honor a deceased family member. The Board is reviewing options to install an attractive bench and memorial plaque. The location will be between the sidewalk and fence on East Arbor beneath the ash tree more or less across from Rheims Ct. A short sidewalk may also be installed from East Arbor up to the sidewalk where the bench will be placed to allow safe access from the street up the grassy slope to reach the sidewalk.

If this proves to be attractive and affordable, a similar walkway from the street up the grassy slope to the sidewalk on West Arbor Circle may also be considered in the future.

January Board Meeting Highlights

President Brian Smith opened the meeting with the usual reports: reading of the last minutes; Treasurer report noting dues increase to \$136 per month, moving \$75K into a 6-month CD with 4.32% APR, and decision to purchase a storage shed to install in the RV lot to hold HOA filing cabinets and other property. Both reports were approved.

The Architectural Control Committee approved several home updates.

The RV storage lot still has spaces open and available to rent.

Neighborhood Watch had nothing to report. Jody Blackmer is working with Director Robin Cyr on updating documents in the New Homeowner and New Renter welcome packets that contain community rules and regulations, a Welcome letter, etc. Robin asked that if anyone was aware of changes needing to be made to any of the documents that changes be sent directly to her at robin.cyr341@outlook.com.

The Little Free Library is fully stocked.

New business:

Brian Smith reported that he is working with Xcel Energy on replacing burned out street lights. Some have already been replaced. Several more are pending. Xcel is being provided with a key to the south pump house gated enclosure so they can accurately read the electric meter mounted there.

The Xeriscape Committee will not be meeting in the future. The HOA is going to be contacting some landscape contractors directly to discuss near-term and longer-term xeriscaping solutions that will provide a consistent look where implemented and coordinate with John Harrison for irrigation system impacts. Xeriscaping for a community this large cannot be done in a piecemeal fashion so more information on that will be upcoming as spring approaches.

The next meeting will be April 27, 2024 at Redlands United Methodist Church.
